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DIGITAL CANOPIES

Inspired by the natural contours of Lake Goolgoolup – once a vital meeting place and resource for the Whadjuk people that ran through the Perth CBD until the 1800s – the Digital Canopies blend function with artistry.

By day, the curving canopies provide welcome shade and mirror the amphitheatre's organic form. By night, the underside comes alive with a spectacular light installation, programmable to align with events and art showcases.

DIGITAL TOWER

Standing 45 metres tall, the Digital Tower is an unmissable landmark at the heart of Yagan Square. Inspired by the bulrushes that once thrived in Lake Goolgoolup's wetlands. Its towering prongs represent the 14 Noongar language groups, making it a striking fusion of culture and technology.

Spanning 2,300sqm, the digital canvas showcases everything from abstract visuals and contemporary art to live-streamed events and community stories.

WIRIN

Wirin stands tall at the heart of Yagan Square—a landmark, a wayfinder and a spiritual presence. Taking its name from the Noongar word for spirit, Wirin represents the enduring creative force that connects all life on Boodja (Mother Earth).

Its strong, elongated form emerges from the land, symbolising the unbroken connection between people, culture and Country. With a spear in one hand and a mirra (spear thrower) in the other, Wirin grounds itself in the earth, reflecting the unity of spirit and strength.

Facing north, it watches the sun's path, standing as a guardian over the square and the city beyond. Created by Tjyllyungoo (Lance Chadd), in collaboration with Trish Robinson and Stuart Green (Big Spoon Art Service), Wirin is a powerful expression of Noongar cultural knowledge, resilience and the deep ties between people and place.

WATERLINE

Water flows through Yagan Square as both a physical and symbolic thread, connecting the past and present. Designed by WA artist Jon Tarry in collaboration with ASPECT Studios, the **Waterline** is a sculptural water feature inspired by the natural waterways that once defined this landscape.

Water cascades through Yagan Square—past the amphitheatre, gardens and terraces—before reaching Yagan Square mall.

Approaching the project as a sculptor, Jon Tarry used digital and traditional techniques to shape the ground as if carved by water over time. Through erosion-like grooves and scalloped stone surfaces, his design captures the natural process of water shaping the landscape.

PASSENGER

Passenger by Australian artist Paul Carter is a text-based artwork that unfolds across seven sculptural forms, each echoing the determined footsteps of Noongar woman Balbuk (1840–1907) as she protested against colonial encroachment.

Inspired by the writings of welfare worker and anthropologist Daisy Bates (1863–1951), the work intertwines past and present, inviting visitors to step into a layered story of resistance and passage.

Positioned at key points through Yagan Square, the seven silhouettes represent both physical and cultural journeys—

tracks once walked, barriers once defied and histories that refuse to be erased. The words, scattered across these forms, only fully reveal their meaning as visitors move through the space, becoming passengers in the ongoing narrative of Yagan Square. Through this interplay of text and movement, Passenger places Balbuk's defiance and Daisy Bates' observations at the heart of Yagan Square's evolving story.

Embedded within Waterline, the Discovery Trail highlights the deep connections between water, animals and Whadjuk culture. Eleven bronze plaques, featuring hand-drawn artworks by Dr. Richard Walley OAM, depict native flora, fauna and Noongar cultural symbols.

These intricate sketches, cast in bronze and inlaid into the stone, offer a lasting tribute to Whadjuk knowledge—guiding visitors through stories of Whadjuk Country as they explore the precinct.



LIQUID FIRE

Sharyn Egan's Liquid Fire brings warmth and vibrancy to Yagan Square. Made from Balga plant resin—a material Noongar people have used for millennia—this illuminated artwork reflects both cultural tradition and artistic innovation.

Egan's creative process is deeply intuitive, allowing the resin to guide the work's evolution. Through years of experimentation, she has uncovered new ways to shape and express this ancient medium, using it to embody the enduring presence of Noongar culture and connection to Country.
